## BIOS OF KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

### **Professor Barbara Harriss-White**

Professor Barbara Harriss-White is Professor Emeritus of Development Studies and Emeritus Fellow of Wolfson College of the University of Oxford. Her research interests include the political economy of India and poverty and social welfare, particularly on the issues of destitution, disability, malnutrition, and gender-biased development in South Asia. She has a long-term interest in agrarian transformation in Southern India and has tracked the economy of a market town there since 1972.

She held academic posts at the University of Oxford since 1987 until her retirement in 2011. She has been an adviser to the UK'S Department of International Development (DFID) and to seven UN organisations, as well as a trustee of the International Food Policy Research Institute and of Norway's Institute for Environment and Development.

Among her works are *Middle India and Urban-Rural Development: Four Decades of Change* (2015), *China-India: Pathways of Economic and Social Development* (2014), and *India Working: Essays on Society and Economy* (2002).

Her keynote for the DD16 is entitled 'Researching development as waste'.

### **Professor Dzodzi Tsikata**

Dzodzi Tsikata is Research Professor and Director of the Institute of African Studies, (IAS) at the University of Ghana, Legon-Accra. Prior to assuming her current role, she was Professor at the Institute of Statistical, Social and Economic Research (ISSER), also at the University of Ghana. Since 2015, she has served as the President of the Council for the Development of Social Science Research in Africa (CODESRIA), after she was elected to that role at the 14th general assembly meeting which took place between 8-12 June 2015.

Her academic interests include gender and development issues, as well as gender equity policies and practices. Her research interests further include the exploitation of local contract farmers by large corporate plantations that are often characterized as having 'few linkages' into the economies of the countries that they operate.

Along with researchers from the University of Sussex and University of the Western Cape, Prof. Tsikata received funding from the Economic and Social Sciences Research Council to investigate the pros and cons of commercial farming models in Africa.
