

Looking for Foreign Agents in All the Wrong Places

a United Russia proposal to amend the law regulating nongovernmental organizations.

This leadsation would make life difficult. If not unbeamble, for NOOs that receive funding from foreign sources and are engaged in "political activites," which are broadly defined to mean basically any attempt to change government policy in any sphere or to influence public opinion related to these policies. This, of course, cuts to the core of what NGOs do and why they exist.

The new legislation will youthen the accounting requirements for these NGOs increase the number of inspections and require that they include wamings on their internet sites and printed materials that they are <u>inforcing acents</u> which in Russian is equivalent in meaning to a spy. In addition, the penalties for noncompliance with these requirements will be increased to Solo 000 rubles (515.200) and two years in prison.

These changes to the bill are all well and good, but Putin conspicuously retained the most <u>important restrictions</u> — those that apply to NGOs devoted to building democracy and an open society, election monotioning, protecting human rights, improving transparency and accountability in government and fighting corruption. The Kremlin is most concerned about these NGOs because they expose some of the worst abuses of Putin's vertical-power structure.

Comparative Studies of Multi-stakeholder Initiatives

BACKGROUND TO THE STUDIES

The Task Team sees value in studies that could guide it in its work and commissioned a study on what contributes to good performance of multi-stakeholder initiatives (MSIs).

With an emphasis on in-country initiatives, three questions guided the research: (i) What country conditions work for and against the effectiveness of NSIs? (ii) What attributes do interfocutors require and apply to make MSIs successful? (iii) What do talaeholders' experiences say about improving MSI performance?
